Artist Biographies

Tina Bararian is an award-winning dancer and choreographer. She was the recipient of the "Contact Dance Award" sponsored by Kathleen Rea, founder of REAson d'être dance in Toronto, Canada. Tina holds degrees in Film Studies from York University and Dance Performance from George Brown College and completed her professional training in dance performance at the Martha Graham School in New York City. In 2022, she was selected for the Choreography Mentorship Program with Amanda Selwyn, where she developed her first evening-length piece, "Not Here". This debut work earned her the "People's Choice Artist Award" at Spoke The Hub Residency. In 2024, she premiered her second evening-length show, "57", at The Tank Theater, where it received critical acclaim and led to her invitation to curate and choreograph for the International Human Rights Art Festival. Tina's work explores breath, silence, and confined spaces to generate a natural rhythm within the body and to challenge both the mind and body. She is also deeply influenced by Persian mythology and using tribal movements in contemporary forms. Tina is the visionary founder of "Dancers of Iran", a global platform supporting Iranian dancers in response to Iran's ban on dance since the 1979 Islamic Revolution.

Mai'yah Kau, also known as Maima, The Water Spirit, is an emerging queer Liberian diasporic multidisciplinary artist based in Brooklyn, NY with roots in Staten Island/ Shaolin. Their work weaves together identity, heritage, and spirituality, blending traditional West African dance with contemporary queer performance and burlesque to create ceremonial rituals and embodied storytelling. Through movement and multidisciplinary art, Kau searches for ancestral narratives—both personal and collective—as a way to honor heritage while imagining new futures. Their practice is an ongoing exploration of transformation, resilience, and the fluidity of cultural memory.

Ogemdi Ude is a dance and interdisciplinary artist, educator, and doula based in Brooklyn. Her performance work focuses on Black femme legacies and futures, grief, and memory. Her work has been presented at The Kitchen, Gibney, Harlem Stage, Danspace Project, Abrons Arts Center, BRIC, ISSUE Project Room, Recess Art, Brooklyn Arts Exchange, Center for Performance Research, and for BAM's DanceAfrica festival. As an educator, she has taught at The New School, Princeton University, Sarah Lawrence College, and University of the Arts. She is a 2025-2028 Jerome Hill Artist Fellow, 2024 NEFA National Dance Project Production Grant recipient, a Live Feed Residency Artist at New York Live Arts, and a 2024/2025 BAX Artist-in-Residence. She has been a 2022-2024 Movement Research Artist-in-Residence, 2021 danceWEB Scholar, 2021 Laundromat Project Create Change Artist-in-Residence, and a 2019-2020 Center for Ballet and the Arts at NYU Resident Fellow. In January 2022 she appeared on the cover of Dance Magazine for their annual "25 to Watch" issue. Most recently, she has published a book Watch Me in a collection edited by Thomas DeFrantz and Annie-B Parson: Dance History(s): Imagination as a Form of Study published by Dancing Foxes Press and Wesleyan University Press.
